WELCOME TO THE SING FOR YOUR SCHOOL CELEBRATION!

It's a great pleasure to be introducing you to our celebration concert at the end of the first year of Sing for Your School. All of our schools tonight took on the challenge of creating lyrics and in many cases melodies, harmonies and accompaniment and I hope had a great time coming up with ideas and shaping them into the performances you will hear. Songs are such an important part of our cultural identity, regardless of style, they mean many things to people and live with us through the ups and downs of life. It's really important to the Music Education Hub that we encourage expression and creativity through songs and singing.

The project started when Cambridge News and Media asked us to design a small initiative to encourage songwriting in schools. This was something we were keen to support as part of our singing strategies in schools and encouraging the cross-over with literacy and music in the classroom. What started small grew into a much greater challenge with, in the end, over 40 schools taking part. As part of this they had access to resources especially created by our team, an online chart, training workshops for school teachers, workshops in schools for the pupils and feedback from experienced songwriters and musicians.

Sitting down with Ilarna and Dan to select tonight's performers from all of the wonderful songs created was an enjoyable occasion - so many different ideas and clever uses of words and melodies made it very difficult to pick between the songs that had been nominated by our reviewers.



I'd like to thank all the teachers who took the time to be involved, my fellow judges and reviewers and Cambridgeshire Music colleagues who designed and made the resources or delivered workshops but most of all thank you to all our young songwriters and their supporters for making this project such a success.

How the selection process worked...

All of the songs in the Sing for Your School chart were listened to by our team of 'Official Reviewers'. Each song received feedback, in the form of chart comments, from at least one of the reviewers on lyric writing, melody and song construction. Reviewers put forward their shortlists of songs to be considered for selection for performance at the Sing for Your School Celebration event.

The musical and lyrical merits of each of the contenders were discussed at length by the judges Matthew Gunn (Head, Cambridgeshire Music), Ilarna Nche and Dan Wilde when they met on 6th January. Carefully considered feedback from the day's discussions was sent to schools for each of the shortlisted songs, including;

All of the schools involved in tonight's celebration have been working with the team from Historyworks over the past few weeks, filming their pieces and sharing their Sing for Your School experiences on camera. Helen Weinstein and Mario Satchwell have supported all 8 of the finalists in rehearsing their songs and practicing warmups to help with pitch and range. You'll get a taster of this tonight, when we do vocal warm-ups with not only the performers, but with the entire audience!

Helen at Historyworks was instrumental in bringing in Michael Rosen as our 'Special Guest Reviewer' to give unique feedback on the lyrics and his insight into the meaning of the songs for the winning schools. In Michael's words;

It has been fantastic looking at the lyrics of the songs and hearing the performances for the 'Sing for Your School' project!



I'm over-awed and stunned by the sheer talent that the young people have – the way in which they've conjured up images, the way they've conjured up pride, the way the school pupils show the fact that they welcome each other - all this has made me feel very

All I can say to everyone, especially the young people and their teachers involved, is, please do more! I want to hear more, I want to read more. Think about the places that you live in, the places that you work, and tell us about it! I want everyone to be inspired, as I have been, to read more song lyrics and hear more songs performed from Cambridgeshire Schools in the future!

Michael Rosen's best known lyrical work for younger children is 'We're Going On a Bear Hunt' which was made into an animated film shown on Christmas Eve 2016. Pathway 2: used supplied backing track to help us write our song

Year 5 and 6 classes

'A Big Bottisham Welcome' captures the school's vision and values and shows how the school welcomes people, extending friendship to everyone.

We looked at how many languages we had spoken in our two classes, and tried to incorporate them. In the end we used Italian, Hebrew, Turkish, German and Spanish.

The rap section was created out of Bottisham's 5 Golden Rules which 'the children try to keep all the time!' Writing the song was a truly collaborative and inclusive experience - as the main message implies

- involving all the children across both classes. Children wrote and voted for their favourite lyrics, melodies and rap soloists. Even with three verses there were plenty of ideas they had to miss out!

Many of the children in this group are not involved in Bottisham Primary's school choir or other extra-curricula music making activities, so for many of them, this will be the first time they are performing on a public stage. How exciting is that!

The children have sung the song in assemblies, to help teach it to the whole school. They also have been very busy getting their friends and family to listen to their song, attracting listeners from all over the world!

MICHAEL ROSEN

'Coldham's Common' is a poem I have written about a significant place in Cambridge. It was inspired by finding out about it's landscape and history. There were amazing stories about local people grazing cows and keeping chickens and finding their firewood for free on this land. These Cambridge people, called 'commoners', were against losing their common land and so in 1594 they rose up against local landowners. Under the leadership of a commoner, Jake of the Style, they resisted enclosure and as a result the land is still for all the commoners today and is naturally grazed by cows and managed as a nature reserve for everyone to enjoy!

I love writing poetry and also performing poetry is very important to me. It's good to find stories that matter to you about your life, your family and friends, and places that mean something special to you.

'As Time Flies By' is a joyful and catchy, up-beat ballad that links to both flight and the passage of time. It reflects on the journey made through the school from Reception to the final year - 'how it was frightening and new at first; how we found it challenging and exciting as we took opportunities to grow and to learn'.

The song is a celebration of our pride in Duxford school, of how welcoming and friendly it is and of how we will miss it when we move on.

Inspired by the special connection the school has with the local airfield, the children describe how, while they are busy learning in school, Spitfires and helicopters are often roaring overhead practising their displays. The song is jam-packed with references to planes and to flying. Creating 'As Time Flies By', which has been performed in class assembly and at 'Grandparents Day', was a new experience for many of the children involved. The musicians in the class got to compose for the first time, for others it has given a first taste of singing in a choir.

It means a lot to have worked on something together – to create something from scratch – and then to have it in the finals. We are very proud. Also, planes are cool!
